Speakers

Latimore M. Smith was born and raised in Louisiana. He resides in Tangipahoa Parish with his wife, Nelwyn McInnis. He has been an avid student of Louisiana's native flora and natural habitats for nearly 30 years.

In 1983, he received an M. S. in Wildlife Biology from LSU. Since 1986, he has been the plant community ecologist for the Louisiana Natural Heritage Program of the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. As ecologist with the Heritage Program, he has studied the floristic composition, functional dynamics, and physiographic variation of Louisiana's native plant communities. He has worked with industry, state, and federal agencies, academia, and numerous private organizations and landowners in the conservation of Louisiana's natural heritage.

Latimore's principal area of study and conservation work has been with Louisiana's longleaf pine forests, savannahs, and associated plant communities.

Latimore's topic will be conservation projects - past and present.

Hallie Dozier was born in Dallas, grew up in Shreveport and has lived in California, Florida, France and Africa. She now lives in Baton Rouge with her husband and "a passel of cats and dogs." Hallie served in the Peace Corps in former Zaire where she worked on beekeeping and honey production.

Her credentials include a B.A. in Foreign Languages, Centenary College of Louisiana; a M. S. in Vocational Education, LSU; and a Ph. D. in Forest Ecology, University of Florida.

Hallie's program will be on Invasive Species.

Don Reed works for the LSU Ag Center with an Extension appointment as an Associate Professor in the School of Renewable Natural Resources. His work with county agents and 4-H programs through out the state entails Extension Programming in forestry and wildlife. He has a B. S. in Forestry with Wildlife minor, a M. S. in Wildlife Management, and a Ph. D. in Forestry from LSU.

Don's topic will be about plants resistant to Deer Predation.

Directions

Camp Grant Walker is the LSU Ag Center 4-H Camp in south Grant Parish. It is located 2 miles east of US 165, near Pollock. *Watch the speed limits!*

From the south, travel U.S. 165 north out of Alexandria. Just after the highway narrows from 4-lane to 2-lane, turn right onto LA 8; travel 2 miles to the camp on the left.

From the north, just after you pass through Pollock, and 1/4 mile south of the railroad track; turn left on LA 8; travel 2 miles to the camp on the left.

From the east, take LA 8 in Jena and travel about 19 miles southwest to the camp.

Accommodations

Camp Grant Walker has nice Men or Women 's Dorms. Bring your own linens, towels, and pillow. (And earplugs) Very clean, heated, tiled bathhouses are in separate buildings - definitely not a rustic setup. Lodging fees are \$5 per person per night. The same fee applies for RV camping, also.

Meals

Friday evening is traditionally a pot luck meal (a big feast in my two year experience - *editor*). The camp kitchen is closed to us on Friday night, so plan to provide whatever ice chest, heating, or serving utensils you might need.

On Saturday, the camp cooks provide an ample southern style breakfast for \$4, and their delicious baked chicken lunch for \$5. Saturday supper is on your own.

For those opting for the field trip to the Southern Forest Heritage Museum on Sunday, a continental breakfast and sandwiches for lunch will be available. (Donations welcome in food or \$.)

Registration

A registration fee of \$9.00 per person covers the cost of building rental and insurance at Camp Grant Walker. Meals and lodging are separate. See registration form for details. If you want meals at the meeting, it is important to pre-register and mail fees to Jackie Duncan by January 23.

There will be no charge for the field trip to the Southern Forest Heritage Museum on Sunday to inspect the native and heritage plantings. Those wanting the guided tour of the 57 acre historic sawmill complex site and rail motorcar ride can pay the group tour rate of \$7.25 at the Museum.
